2016 Referendum Newsletter

Dear Community Member,

Just this month, New Jersey Monthly Magazine announced that Chatham High School ranked as the Number One high school in the state for the second consecutive time. While we take all school rankings with a huge grain of salt, we are nonetheless proud of this honor and recognize that a primary reason for the accolade is the generous investment and support our community has devoted to the academic and extracurricular programming available to our students. We are now asking you to consider additional investments related to the infrastructure and facilities of our schools—investments that we believe will help enable our schools to continue to provide the very best learning experiences for our students.

Over the past year and half, our Board of Education and district administration have been working to present to the community an improved referendum proposal that will address the most critical infrastructure needs in the school district while costing approximately \$10 million less than the initial 2015 referendum proposal. We are grateful for your extensive, invaluable input that helped our district arrive at this important point.

During the fall, we surveyed all residents to gauge support for potential projects, held four public community feedback sessions to gather your input directly, published the results from roughly 1,200 residents who completed a survey or attended a meeting, and held discussions at the public Board of Education meetings regarding the content and format of a referendum. As a result of this process and our detailed understanding of the district's infrastructure, we determined that six projects were particularly vital, time-sensitive, and well-supported by the public. Over the past four months, we have held six open information sessions about the projects and provided tours of our facilities so that residents could see firsthand the needs of our schools. We appreciate the time that many of you took to speak with us and share your thoughts about the proposals.

We are excited to present this proposal to our community in the form of a referendum vote on September 27. This date was the earliest possible date a vote could be held in accordance with state law and with the time-intensive process we believed necessary to gather community input and feedback. Holding a vote on one of the two later dates in 2016 allowed by state law would cause a delay to the start of any approved project and also could adversely impact curricular and extracurricular programs that are date-dependent, such as a theatrical production or athletic season.

REFERENDUM OVERVIEW

Summary

After surveying members of the community and holding public feedback sessions last fall, the Board of Education determined that there were six projects that were both critical in need and that received support from the majority of the survey respondents. The projects are listed to the right, along with their estimated net costs.

The projects will appear in the same order on the ballot and will be voted upon as distinct measures. That is, a voter may cast a "yes" or "no" vote for each measure, and only those projects gaining a majority "yes" vote will move forward.

The date of September 27 is one of five allowed by the state for the purpose of holding a referendum vote. The two earlier dates in 2016—January 26 and March 8—did not provide us enough time to gather sufficient community input or fully develop our projects. The two later dates—November 8 and December 13—would delay the start of any project gaining approval from our voters and impact the completion dates of these important projects. Thus the earliest possible date we could have selected to hold this vote is September 27.

If you will be out of town on September 27, mail-in ballot applications are available at the school district offices, as well as the offices of both municipal clerks.

The tax impact estimates are based on a 20-year bond at a 3.25% interest rate, and assume that all projects gain approval.



ENROLLMENT OVERVIEW

Since the April 2005 referendum, the district enrollment has steadily climbed. The Board of Education has commissioned demographic reports from professional forecasters during this period, the most recent of which were conducted during the 2012/2013 and 2014/2015 school years. As you can see, actual enrollment has outpaced the forecasts from the professional demographers. The increase in students has stretched our facilities and limited the district's flexibility to optimally run certain programs. In addition, it has forced the district to divert investment away from critical infrastructure and into additional classroom space that has been added in incremental steps to handle the increased number of students. At the current time, there is an immediate need for more classroom space at the elementary level and improvements in critical infrastructure. This referendum seeks to address these needs.

Referendum—CHATHAM HIGH SCHOOL

Two of the projects would impact Chatham High School and Lafayette Avenue School. The first is the renovation of the auditorium, built in the early 1970s and outdated in terms of its furnishings, ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) standards, and other features. The second project would be a partial roof replacement at the schools. Like all \Rightarrow Replace original carpeting portions of roofs in the proposal, those at CHS and LAF have surpassed their life expectancies. 40% of the cost of all roofing projects would be offset by the state.

Critical Needs Met

- ⇒ Replace original seating and furnishings
- ⇒ Bring facility into ADA compliance
- ⇒ Replace portion of roof
- ⇒ Replace HVAC system


Lafayette School (LS) Partial Roof Replacements

Referendum—CHATHAM MIDDLE SCHOOL


There are two projects proposed at Chatham Middle School: the renovation of the existing auditorium and the construction of three new lab spaces that will house our Design and Technology program. The projects include the removal of all asbestos-tile flooring in this wing of the school and the conversion of the wing into a modern S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) facility. A portion of the middle school roof will also be replaced if voters approve the final referendum question.

Critical Needs Met

- ⇒ Remove asbestos flooring
- ⇒ Replace seating, furnishings, and roofing system
- ⇒ Install HVAC system, modern lighting and sound systems
- ⇒ Create modern lab spaces to meet curricular needs
- ⇒ Update art classrooms

Referendum—COUGAR FIELD COMPLEX




- ⇒ Install new, ADA-compliant bleachers

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Referendum—MILTON AVENUE SCHOOL

There is currently insufficient space in our three elementary schools. In each building, certain programs are forced to share classrooms or take place in non-classroom areas. For multiple years now, our enrollment has exceeded demographic projections. This year, our enrollment is at its highest point in the history of the district. Building four classrooms at MAS will provide more flexibility to move stand-alone programs from \Rightarrow Provide more flexibility in the future for a full-day kindergarten other buildings to MAS, thus opening space in all elementary schools.

Referendum—ROOF REPLACEMENTS

Our school buildings all have sections of roof of varying ages due to the addition of classrooms in stages over time. Four portions of roof are due for replacement. By incorporating these projects into a referendum, the district will qualify for state debt service, which will reduce the net cost to the taxpayer by 40%. If these projects are funded through the operating budget, the district is not eligible for state debt service.
