COURSE/GRADE LEVEL(S): AP German Grade 12

I. <u>Course Overview</u>

The demands of this course equal that of a typical first year, college level foreign language offering. Course work is exceptionally demanding. Classes are conducted entirely in the target language. Daily conversation and written work center on current events and articles of cultureal, historical, or literary importance. The emphasis of the course is developing and refining communication skills: specifically speaking, writing, reading, and listening. Students who successfully complete this course should be at the ACTFL Pre-Advanced proficiency level.

III.Learning Objectives

As aligned with the 2009 NJCCCS, by the conclusion of this course, students should be able to:

- G. Write with good sentence structure and paragraph organization, expressing both concrete and abstract ideas and concepts.
- H. Demonstrate knowledge of the culture of the German speaking people by comparing and contrasting attitudes and values of German and American cultures.

IV. Essential Questions

Unit 1: The AP Test

What is the structure of the test and how are different sections weighted and scored? How can I best strategize to succeed on each section of the test?

Unit 2: Current events

What is relevant in German right now? What's happening?

What can we learn about German culture based on what is reported in their newspapers and in other forms of media?

What are some typical vocabulary and structures used in German news?

How is a German newspaper organized? A news website? A radio news show? A TV news program?

Unit 3: Free Time Activities

How do German young people spend their time as compared to American young people? What does this say about them as a culture?

How do free time interests translate into future careers? What are my life and career goals and why?

How can one argue Berlin as a world city? What unique things can one do and see in Berlin How is the German view on work expressed in certain poems and short stories?

Unit 4: German Reunification

What were the major events that led to the reunification? How did these events and the reunification affect the lives of common citizens?

What are current perspectives and issues in Germany? How do the eastern Germans view the western Germans and vice-versa? Is reunification still an issue ?

How does the movie "Das Versprechen" illustrate the events leading to reunification from a personal perspective? How are the viewpoints of both sides of Germany represented?

Unit 5: Foreigners in Germany

What do we, as Americans, understand by the term "multicultural society" and how might a German understand the same idea?



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What problems might a foreigner experience in Germany? Why are some Germans prejudiced against foreigners? How does this compare to prejudice in our country?

Unit 6: Nirgendwo in Afrika

How do different cultures assimilate into others? Can I understand the colloquialisms used in the film? Can I express my opinions using hypothetical situations?

Unit 7: Families and Human Relationships

What is considered typically female and typically male in Germany and in the US? What are typical gender roles in the home and in the workplace in Germany? How are these changing?

How is the relationship between parents and children in German similar to and different from that in the US?

Unit 8: German Literature

Which authors from different literature periods have had a large impact on German culture? For which works are these authors best known and how do these works exemplify their styles?

V. Key Performance and Benchmark Tasks

Unit 1: After each unit in the class, students will be given an assessment similar in form to the AP exam. This is ongoing throughout the year, with one full introductory session in September.

Unit 2: Quizzes on content, vocabulary and structure

Unit 3: Test in AP Format, essay

Unit 4: Test in AP Format, essay, paired presentations on movie

Unit 5: Test in AP Format, essay

Unit 6: Test in AP Format, reflective essay

Unit 8: Final project on an author and his works
