#### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOMS ...

**PRE-SCHOOL:** The preschool students jumped into the new year by studying winter topics such as bears, penguins and snowmen. We read <u>Snowmen At Night</u> and brainstormed our own ideas about what snowmen might be doing at nighttime! The pre-k students also began their study on clothes. They explored the features of clothes, what clothes are made of and how to take care of



clothes. The dramatic play area was transformed into a nursery filled with baby clothes, a clothing store for buying and selling clothing and a laundromat where they learned to wash, dry, iron and fold clothes. The clothing study will conclude with a focus on clothes worn by various community helpers. This will lead the preschoolers into a new study on buildings in our community. The preschoolers are looking forward to playing in their post office and celebrating Valentine's Day next month!

**KINDERGARTEN:** 3... 2... 1... HAPPY NEW YEAR! The kindergarteners began 2020 by setting new reading goals for themselves. The children thought about which "Reading Super Power" they felt they needed to improve on and have been persevering each day towards accomplishing their goal. In math, we learned about subtraction and are practicing decomposing numbers. Kindergarten scientists are learning about pushes and pulls by studying roller coasters! We're looking forward to Valentines Day with our Kindergarten Sweethearts!

**FIRST GRADE:** Happy New Year from first grade! First graders made goals for the New Year. They not only made goals for themselves, but they made a plan on how they will work to achieve their goals. In reading and writing we are learning about nonfiction. We are reading more nonfiction books and learning about all of the features that go into nonfiction books. Students are learning to recognize, read, and understand those features as they learn about the world around them. As writers, students are writing *All About* books. They are putting Table of Contents, headings, captions, boldface print, and glossaries in their books. They are experts and are teaching readers of their books all the things they know about a topic. Please have your child point out all of those features to you when they are reading nonfiction books at home. In math, we have learned about graphs. We have learned how to collect, represent, and interpret data for tally charts and picture graphs. Please have your child continue to practice their math fluency at home with Splash math. We are looking forward to the busy month of February with the 100th day of school and Valentines Day!

**SECOND GRADE:** Second graders began 2019 plunging into nonfiction in both Reading and Writing Workshop. Our students have been engaged and motivated as they diligently work on writing expert books on topics they know well. Second grade mathematicians have become more confident in solving math stories with and without regrouping. Fact fluency is important for all students to continue to work on at home. As we enter February, second grade scientists will continue to explore landforms on earth, how they changed over time ,and investigate how Earth's events can change the shape of the land. Social emotional learning, as well as growth mindset, continues to be reinforced in the classroom.

**THIRD GRADE:** Third graders rang in the New Year by setting new goals using our 20 20 vision. These included enhancing a reading skill, memorizing math facts, or improving on a work habit. In language arts, students read informational texts and wrapped up the unit by learning about narrative nonfiction. As mathematicians, we have moved into addition and subtraction with regrouping.

Students learned that the best way to check their work is to estimate by rounding or using the inverse operation. Ask your child to tell you about Sheep in a Jeep and what they have learned about forces and motion in science!

We ended the month of January with The Great Kindness Challenge (GKC: the happiest week of the year)! This week is dedicated to creating a culture of kindness on school campuses across the nation. January has been a month of research across the grades. While our students discovered new ways to gather information, they also showed me many tricks on using Google Classroom. They are great teachers as well as great learners!



Third grade's research on climate tied in with their classroom study on weather. We learned about regional influences, surprising weather, and extreme conditions. We will wrap up our work by creating a digital closet that reflects the climate we studied.

States were the focus of **second grade** research, with each student exploring a different state. Although each student was working independently on his or her state, there was still great collaboration and sharing of information and skills. I was really impressed with how well these classes worked with one another.

**First graders** worked in pairs to learn about animal adaptations. Their partnerships not only brought great information, but also demonstrated teamwork and cooperation. I was so impressed with their work and effort!

In **Kindergarten**, we did an author study on the ever-popular Mo Willems. While most students know his Elephant and Piggie series, along with his Pigeon books, students were surprised to discover the "Elephant and Piggie Like Reading" series, written by other authors, but endorsed by those two beloved characters. We also learned about Mo Willems earlier success on Sesame Street. Mo Willems has been compared to Dr. Seuss and has been awarded the most *Theodor Seuss Geisel Honors for Best Books for Beginning Readers*.

Which brings me to my favorite way to wrap up January - the ALA Book Awards. In the coming weeks, we will be taking a look at the most recent Geisel, Caldecott, Sibert, and Newbery Award and Honor books. **Contagious Illnesses:** There have been a few reported cases of influenza, 'strep-throat' and colds over the last few weeks. Influenza-likeillness is listed as high activity during this time of year in New Jersey according to the CDC. Please keep your child home if they are experiencing any of the following symptoms:

Report absences via ParentPortal:

**DO NOT email** teacher!

A fever 100 degrees or higher. Students should not return to school until their temperature is normal for 24 hours without fever reducing medication.

- A frequent cough (may be associated with Strep-throat and/ or colds)
- Ear pain and/or eye drainage (ear infections are not contagious, but the viruses that usually cause them are)

•Sore throat with fever, rash, or headache

Please seek prompt medical attention if you think you or you viral medications can reduce the severity of flu-symptoms.

Flu-like symptoms appear quickly and may include high fe Please seek prompt medical attention if you think you or your child(ren) have flu-like symptoms as anti-

Flu-like symptoms appear quickly and may include high fever, a severe headache, muscle and body aches, chills, sore throat, exhaustion, and dry cough. Children may also have nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. Please visit cdc.gov for more information about influenza in our area.

\*Reminder\* Please be sure your child dresses appropriately for the weather. Recess is required for every child and they will be outside if the temperature is 20 degrees Fahrenheit (with the wind chill) or greater. If your child does not have or refuses to wear appropriate clothing, they may not be able to participate in recess.

# MUSIC

First Grade has started learning to read and sing two of the eight solfège notes, called so and mi, on the music staff. Fun singing games, such as "Old Mr. Woodpecker" and "Lemonade," have given students the chance to practice reading and singing these notes. We also continue to practice quarter note and eighth note rhythm patterns, and will be ready for quarter rests soon! We played Staff Champion to practice identifying lines and spaces of the music staff. If your child has signed up for a free Quaver Music account at home, Staff Champion games are available in the Music Theory section

of the Student Interactives (accessed from the yellow sign on Quaver Street).

Second Grade continues to review quarter notes, eighth notes and quarter rests, as well as reading and singing so, mi and la on the music staff. We've learned singing games such as "Pizza, Pizza, Daddy-O" and "We Are Dancing in the Forest" to help review reading and writing rhythms and rests.

Third Grade has already started to learn their Spring Concert music! They are excited to sing songs all about food this April! We continue to review reading and singing the pentatonic solfège notes: do, re, mi, so, and la. We recently learned about sixteenth notes and rests through the singing games "Dinah" and "Paw Paw Patch." Knowing all of our rhythms will be very important when we play recorders later this year!

Finally, Kindergarten is learning all about high and low sounds, using our voices as whispers, talking, singing, shouting, and testing their loud and soft sounds through fun singing games like "Grizzly Bear", "My Pony Macaroni", and tons more through music and stories.

#### From the Art Room

**Kindergarteners** returned from the Holiday break and painted New Years fireworks with tempera paint on black paper. They have also worked on winter related projects. We did a drawing of a snowman using blue crayola markers which was brushed with water to create a painted effect. We just started a winter tree project using cool colors blue, green, and purple.

**First grade** has been working on cities reflected in water. We discussed reflections and viewed examples of cities by water. Students sketched cities with crayon and folded paper and rubbed back with ruler to create a reflection below. Students colored the top neatly and then painted the reflection in a more loose painterly way.

**Second Graders** have been learning about Koi fish. They are working on Koi fish in ponds using a variety of drawing and painting materials. Students had fun learning about these special fish that are considered beautiful as well as good luck. Fun fact: the Oldest living Koi Fish named Hanako lived to the age of 226 years.

**Third graders** recently finished high contrast positive and negative trees. In art, positive space is the subject, and negative space is the background. Students painted trees that filled the paper with branches that overlapped and touched the edges of the paper. Students then used bright fluorescent paints to fill the background.

**Kindergarten:** Students discussed mindfulness and discussed books about the practice of being mindful during both classroom activities and outside of the school. This mindfulness can range from listening to the teacher to how they may participate in an activity.

**First Grade:** Students have been reviewing nutrition and "My Plate". We discussed the importance of a balanced variety of nutritious foods, and how they contribute to wellness. We also talked about why some foods are healthier to eat than others.


**Second Grade:** Students recently learned about germs and medicine. We learned about bacteria and viruses and how they can make us sick. We also learned about over the counter versus prescription medicines. Students learned about vaccines and how they can help prevent certain illnesses, and various terminology about medicine, such as dose, pharmacy, side effect, and drug facts label. An emphasis was placed on safety and making sure that parents are supervising any medicine use. A large focus was also placed on ways to help prevent the spread of germs, such as: washing hands, covering a cough/sneeze, staying away from sick people, getting enough sleep, and other methods to help stop and slow the spread of germs.

**Third Grade:** Students learned how to set an effective goal and they each came up with a personal health goal. The focus of this activity was not just for the students to make the connection that health goals are not just physical goals, but goals can also be emotional, social, spiritual (values) or intellectual (learning). We used the word S.M.A.R.T. to help design an effective goal. Is the goal **S**pecific, **M**easurable, **A**ttainable, **R**ealistic, and **T**imely? By using the SMART goal design, students have a framework to help set effective goals that they are more likely to follow through at any age or point in their lives.

The new year brings new design challenges for our Milton engineers. Here are some of the challenges we are working on now.

Kindergarten – Students were introduced to Benny the Bear, a polar bear who somehow got lost on a deserted island. He needs help using the resources available to build a habitat that meets his needs.

First Grade – Students read the story of how elephants from the circus were used to test the Brooklyn Bridge when it was first built. They are now researching different types of bridges and determining which materials will be best for the strength and stability of their own model bridges.

Second Grade – Students were introduced to Larry the Leprechaun, who discovered a pot of gold. They are now researching more about boats, buoyancy and properties of materials to help them design and build a boat model to help Larry bring his gold home.

Third Grade – Students have been learning about how helmets are used to protect athletes from injuries while playing sports. They are currently researching sports that do not require helmets to gather information that will help them create a helmet model for sports like soccer, basketball, or gymnastics.

Kindergarten students have been working on gross and fine motor skills with various activities. Students try to focus on personal space and general space during games. Kindergarteners also work on motor skills using scooters, balls, and some tumbling.

First grade students learned basketball skills this month. Students all had opportunities to practice their dribbling, shooting, and passing skills. When dribbling, the emphasis was to have students do their best to maintain their dribble while moving throughout the space in the gym. There was a mixture of skill levels with basketball skills, but it is important for the students to know that skills like dribbling and shooting are skills that the students can practice by themselves on their own time, which is a great thing about basketball. We will continue to work on these skills from time to time throughout the school year.

Second and Third grade students have been working on team concept skills. Students designed their own game in small groups, using fitness and manipulate concepts. As a group, they designed the game rules and directions and focused on working together. With the football season coming to an end, students participated in modified game called "End Zone" as students worked together to throw a pass to a teammate to score a touchdown.




#### MAD SCIENCE NIGHT AT CMS! FAMILY FUN NIGHT MARCH 6, 2020
