# Message from the Principal

We are so thankful for the many experiences we had at Milton Avenue School during the month of November. In addition to the children experiencing solid instruction in the classrooms, many events and activities highlighted the happenings in our school. Our families demonstrated how giving they are to important community members through our Candy for the Troops campaign and the school-wide Lego collection. Our Veteran's Day assembly gave us the opportunity to recognize and honor some of the Veterans from our Milton learning community through song and special speeches from our students and the Veterans themselves.

Thanks to the generosity of our PTO, we were able to welcome an artist in residence, Caren Frost Olmsted, who worked with all of our students to create a beautiful mural that represents many of the things that make Milton Avenue School as special as it is. This was truly a team project as parent volunteers, students, and staff all had a helping hand in the creation of a piece of art that will be part of Milton Avenue School for years to come.

Below is a picture of our new mural. Each letter is filled with images or symbols that represent our learning community. The "M" includes the front of our school, strongly defined by its columns and front door. The "I" includes an image of a parent walking a child to school. The "L" includes kids playing outside with a focus on "4 Square," which is a popular game to play at recess. The "T" includes various symbols that represent the many content areas that children learn at our school. The "O" includes pictures such as helping hands and hearts to show our strong belief in being kind and caring. Finally, the "N" symbolizes the idea that we have a growth mindset, but our students also grow in height as they progress from preschool to third grade. Our beautiful new addition to our school was mounted in the gym on Monday, November 25!

We just ended our "17 Days of Gratitude" where we discussed someone or something that we are thankful to have in our lives. I continue to be thankful for the wonderful students, parents, and staff that I deal with daily. Have a wonderful Thanksgiving break!

#### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOMS...

PRE-SCHOOL: The Pre-school classes had Fun On The Farm in November. We learned about farm animals and explored many different types of foods that grow on the farm. During play time, we pretended with the barn and the animals. We also washed fruits and vegetables in our sensory table. We finished the month by talking about Thanksgiving and the many things we are thankful for. We moved around like turkeys while we sang the Turkey Hop! We learned how to work cooperatively to make a friendship fruit salad. We each brought in a piece of fruit from home to add to the salad. We enjoyed this special activity with our friends. The pre-school classes look forward to beginning our winter study in December.

**KINDERGARTEN**: It's a bird... it's a plane...No! It's our kindergarten students! Kindergarteners have begun to use their SUPER READING POWERS to help them decode words in books. They can tell you all about Pointer Power, Rereading Power & ECHO Power! In math, we are learning to compare numbers by using math vocabulary words such as "more" and "fewer." Our kindergarteners are learning to show gratitude for people and things in their everyday lives as they learn about our tradition of Thanksgiving in Social Studies. Hope you enjoy the holiday and warm up with a good book and your Super Reader!

FIRST GRADE: November has been a fast and busy month! We are becoming Word Detectives in Reading Workshop. First graders have been learning strategies for using snap words and for decoding. We are word detectives by learning how to notice a problem and how to stop and solve it. We know to look CLOSELY, from start to end, with unknown or tricky words, use everything we know (and have learned), and how to do a s-l-o-w check with a word to make sure it is the correct word and that it makes sense when we are reading. In math, we are learning that addition and subtraction are related to each other and learning about fact families. We are learning that 3 related numbers can show us 2 different subtraction and 2 different addition sentences (unless they are doubles). We will soon be ending our Small Moments unit in writing workshop, and will bring home some reading pieces from that unit. We are learning to edit and revise our work by "Fixing and Fancying" it up! In Science, we are learning about the moon and the patterns the moon makes with the different phases. We are looking forward to the fun month of December and learning about different holidays around the world. We can't wait for our Holiday Concert on December 3.

**SECOND GRADE**: Where has the time gone?! Here we are, wrapping up a very busy November already. The students in second grade have been enjoying their study of the novel, *Molly's Pilgrim* by Barbara Cohen. Project information was sent home with all second graders. We hope the students are enjoying getting to know more about their families and where they have come from as they complete this project. In December, the students will present their pilgrim dolls and share their family's history with the class. It would be helpful if you could remind your child to practice reading their information sheet; speaking loudly and clearly. Just a friendly reminder that the completed doll and information sheet is due on Monday, December 2nd. Second-graders are loving science as they get their hands dirty learning about the properties of matter! In Math, the students continue to practice their math fact fluency while learning to regroup and use a variety of strategies, such as open number lines, hundred chart, and partial sums to add. Please encourage your child to practice their facts at home either using the XtraMath website and/or flashcards. In December, second-grade readers will study characters and their stories. They will also learn to ask questions about what they're reading. In writing, we will learn about and compose Realistic Fiction stories. Finally, we look forward to discussing your child's progress with you during conference week. See you then!

THIRD GRADE: The month of November was a month of deep-level learning throughout all subject areas for our third graders. In writing workshop, they have concluded their unit on Personal Narrative Writing. They studied other authors and used strategies like hooking the reader with a lead, elaborating with "Show not Tell" details, descriptions and dialogue and developing the most important part (heart) of the story. Next up is informational writing and studying the structures that go with that genre. As readers, third graders used their fiction skills most recently by studying mysteries. Mystery lingo like crime solvers, suspects, motives, opportunity, clues and red herrings were used to try to solve the mystery before the crime solvers. Following that, third graders jumped into nonfiction reading and learned to identify the main ideas along with the most important facts within the text. In math, the third grade mathematicians concluded their formal instruction on multiplication and division by calculating the area of a flat shape which enabled them to use multiplication and division concepts in real world applications. Please encourage your child to practice his or her multiplication facts daily as the goal is to automatically recall facts 0-10. In social studies, the students are learning about the early people of New Jersey, including the Lenni Lenape Native Americans and early European Explorers. The students are learning significant events using photos, timelines, maps, globes, and texts, both in print and through the use of technology. Lastly, in science, third graders are concluding their study of weather and climate. They have learned how meteorologists and climatologists use weather tools and study maps. They then looked at patterns to understand the climates around our country and the world.

Counseling Lessons this month (from our Social Emotional Curriculum, Second Step) focused on Empathy and Compassion as well as Feelings. Students watched short videos, engaged in group discussion and responded to scenarios in their journals about these topics.

In addition, the small group counseling sessions are underway! The current groups will run through the New Year, and will be offered again in early spring. Themes for our groups are: separation and divorce, friendship skills, and emotional regulation.



#### MILTON MEETING

We celebrated our students at the monthly Milton Meeting on November 26. Mr. Andreazza talked about the beautiful new addition to the gym, our Milton Mural. He explained what the elements of the mural represent and why they are important to the school. We also recognized students for achievement in Art, Music, P.E., Library and Technology, as well as the Principal's Student of the Month. #### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ...

**First Grade:** Students discussed emotions and feeling sand related them to daily interactions with peers and family. We practiced using "I words" and problem solving when they are frustrated or upset.

**Second Grade**: We are beginning a set of lessons about nutrition. Students reviewed the foods on the MyPlate diagram. They will also be learning about how to read a food label, and to gain a basic understanding as to what is included in the nutrition facts. The students already seem quite knowledgeable about different types of foods, which speaks to the exposure to many different kinds of foods they may have tried up to this point in their lives.

**Third Grade:** The third grade students have started a unit on Nutrition. We have reviewed food labels, and how to read and interpret them. This is a concept that the students learned in second grade, and reviewing it is very helpful to the students' level of understanding. Additionally, we will learn more about how calories work and the three sources of calories (protein, fat and carbohydrates). Finally, we will examine our own food and consumption choices and how they effect the environment around us.

\*Please make sure to update your child's Emergency contacts in the Parent Portal. We need to have an alternate contact besides the student's primary caregiver in case of a medical emergency or unforeseen circumstance that can arrive at the school within 30 minutes if necessary.

**Contagious Illnesses:** Please keep your child home if they are experiencing any of the following symptoms:

- A fever of 100 degrees or higher. Students should not return to school until their temperature is normal for 24 hours without fever reducing medication.
- A frequent cough (may be associated with Strep-throat and/or colds)
- Ear pain and/or eye drainage (ear infections are not contagious, but the viruses that usually cause them are)
- Sore throat with fever, rash, and/or headache
- Vomiting 2 or more times within 24 hours.

\*It is **required** that **any** child attending Preschool, ages 59 months and younger obtain a flu vaccine and documentation is provided to Mrs. Zotti by January 2, 2020. Students will be excluded from school by the Health Department until March 2020 if it is not received by that date.\*

**Holiday Celebrations**- Remember to contact the Room Parents of your child's classroom to arrange bringing food in for the class Holiday celebration well in advance. All classrooms are peanut and nut-free and all items being served must be listed on the <u>Food Permission Form</u> due to severe life threatening allergies.


## Library Lore Jill Mills

Kindergarten students participated in a fifteen minute partner jog, the "Turkey Trot". The importance of cardiovascular endurance and being "Heart Healthy" was discussed and reviewed. In other lessons, students practiced personal and general space related to games and activities. Students also worked on general locomotor and manipulative skills using bean bags and scarves.

First grade students practiced climbing in the gym. The students were able to choose from 3 different stations: the climbing wall, the climbing rope, and the swinging ropes. Climbing is a great activity, not just for the fitness benefits, but students are really able to try to continually improve upon their own personal best efforts. I was blown away at the amount of students who were receptive to feedback regarding their technique, and most students not only showed continual improvement, but also showed that they were willing to challenge themselves with a skill that, for many students, was difficult.
