Message from the Principal

We are so thankful for the many experiences we had at Milton Avenue School during the month of November. In addition to the children experiencing solid instruction in the classrooms, many events and activities highlighted the happenings in our school. Our families demonstrated how giving they are to important community members through our Candy for the Troops campaign and the school-wide collection we were able to accomplish for Operation Jersey Cares. Our Veteran's Day assembly gave us the opportunity to recognize and honor some of the Veterans from our Milton learning community through song and special speeches from our students and the Veterans themselves.

There are so many things that come to mind as the colder weather begins to set in during this time of year. One can find comfort in sipping a mug of hot cocoa, holiday lights begin to twinkle, and the malls get more and more crowded! I find that the best way to stay out of the cold is by warming up with a good book.

I'd like to share some ideas that may be helpful to you, the parents, as you read with your child at home. Experts and educational research show that there are many benefits associated with parents reading with their children on a consistent basis throughout elementary school and beyond. Some of these benefits include instilling a positive attitude towards reading on the part of the child and increasing a child's ability to read and recognize new vocabulary. Here are a few suggestions you can explore while staying out of the cold by reading an exciting book with your child...

- <u>Location, Location</u>: Make reading enjoyable by choosing a comfortable place to read where you are able to listen to each other read. The location chosen should be quiet and free from outside interference.
- <u>Timing is Everything:</u> Be sure to set aside a specific time dedicated to reading each day with your child. This will allow your child to recognize reading as a priority in daily life, and it will ensure "bonding time" between you and your child as you embark upon new adventures within each book.
- The Possibilities are Endless: Reading with your child can go well beyond simply reading the words on the pages. While reading, be sure to help your child learn as you read by using sound strategies to decode new words. Ask your child questions as you read, and encourage your child to talk about the book.By incorporating some of these suggestions into your daily lives while reading with your child, you can allow your child to experience the warmth and comfort of reading books, while promoting a positive attitude towards reading and increasing literacy skills at home.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOMS...



PRE-SCHOOL: The Pre-school classes had Fun On The Farm in November! We learned about harvest and explored different types of vegetables that grow on a farm. We shopped, paid for, and cooked vegetables with friends in our classroom farmers market and kitchen. We washed vegetables in our water table and created art with peppers, carrots, and broccoli at choice time.

A farm isn't complete without someone to scare the crows away so we strengthened our motor skills by stuffing our own classroom scarecrow! Preschoolers learned what it means to be thankful for family and friends. We sang songs, danced like turkeys and listened to stories about Thanksgiving. We even practiced good manners while having a Thanksgiving feast in the dramatic play area. The pre-school classes look forward to beginning a winter study in December. Our dramatic play area will be transformed into a bakery as we prepare for the wonderful winter season!

KINDERGARTEN: It's a bird... it's a plane... No! It's our kindergarten students! Kindergarteners have begun to use their SUPER READING POWERS to help them decode words in books. They can tell you all about Pointer Power and Rereading Power! In math, we are learning to compare numbers by using math vocabulary words such as "more" and "fewer." Our kindergarteners are learning to show gratitude for people and things in their everyday lives as they learned about our tradition of Thanksgiving in Social Studies and by playing the Gratitude Game with our 2nd Grade Buddies. Hope you enjoy the holiday and warm up with a good book and your Super Reader!

FIRST GRADE: November has been a fast and busy month! We are becoming Word Detectives in Reading Workshop. First Graders have been learning strategies for using high frequency words and for decoding. We are becoming word detectives by learning how to notice a problem and how to stop to solve it. We know to look CLOSE-LY from start to end with unknown or tricky words, use everything we know (and have learned) and how to do a *s-l-o-w* check with a word to make sure it is the correct word and that it makes sense when we are reading. In math students are learning different addition strategies such as recognizing doubles, near doubles and when and how to use a ten frame. We also have learned about open number lines. We are starting to come to the end of Small Moments writing in Writing Workshop and soon we will bring home a few of our writing pieces to share. We are learning to edit and revise our work by "Fixing and Fancying" it up! We are looking forward to learning about different holidays around the world and our Holiday Concert on December 4.

SECOND GRADE: During the month of November, second graders have been busy learning about the tolerance of people from different backgrounds using Barbara Cohen's book, *Molly's Pilgrim*. Through both independent and group work, students have gained the understanding that pilgrims are anyone who comes to America seeking a better life. Second graders are loving science! The scientists have been participating in hands-on investigations to teach them about the structure and properties of matter. They have been planning and conducting investigations, observing, analyzing and interpreting their data, and making arguments based on evidence. As we look ahead to December, second grade writers will complete the unit on personal narratives, spending time revising and editing their small moment stories. Second grade mathematicians will be introduced to subtraction strategies within 100. We look forward to celebrating and discussing your child at conferences.

THIRD GRADE: The month of November was a month of deep level learning throughout all subject areas for third graders. In reading, the students used their fiction reading skills while focusing on a new genre: mysteries. Mystery lingo like crime solvers, suspects, culprits, motives, clues and red herrings were used while trying to solve mysteries before the crime solvers did. In writing workshop, the students are finishing up narrative writing pieces. They are demonstrating all they know about hooking their readers into reading their stories, developing the middle or heart of their stories with details, description and dialogue and lastly ending the stories with an action, talk or feeling. Third grad-



ers will share their stories next month with someone special at home. This month in math, third grade mathematicians have been mastering multiplication and division concepts and skills. They enjoyed writing their own math stories and displaying them in the hallway. Please encourage your child to continue to practice basic facts daily. In social studies, third graders have been focusing on the first inhabitants of NJ, the Lenni Lenape Native Americans. On November 13, we all enjoyed the morning at the Reeves Reed Arboretum to get a first hand feel of the Lenni Lenape culture and way of life. Lastly, in science, third graders are becoming meteorologist by studying weather maps and tools. They are learning what effects weather and the climate all around the country.

I can process absences well in advance if your family will be out of town. You **will** receive a notification from School Messenger if your child is not entered or called into the absentee line. Please enter absences in the Parent Portal or call the absentee line before **8:30am and 12:00pm for the afternoon sessions**, if your child will not be coming to school or will be late.

Kindergarten—Benny the Bear's Deserted Island Habitat Design Challenge

Students are learning about what animals need to survive in their habitats and using this information to design a desert island habitat for a polar bear named Benny.



Students are learning about the steps of the engineering design process and how engineers use this process to solve problems and complete challenges.

2nd Grade—Introduction to Google Apps

Students are learning about the various programs to use through Google Apps, including Google Docs, Google Draw, and Google Classroom to create a poster for their house for the little pigs.

3rd Grade—Using Google Draw

Students are learning more about the drawing and creative tools in Google Draw, which they are using to create posters for their Gummy Bear Escape parachute designs.






Typing Rocket ABCYa-Typing Practice for Kindergarten

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Second Grade have created outer space art. This lesson allowed students to apply various art skills like drawing, painting, cutting and gluing. After creating a starred background on black paper, students created a multicolored watercolor painting that was used to trace and cut planets to be glued to the background. Students even learned how to add shadows to the planets to make them appear more like spheres.

Third Grade has been working on tessellation art. A tessellation is a shape that is repeated in an infinite pattern, fitting into itself like a puzzle, with no gaps or overlaps. Students will be challenged to use tessellation tracers of animals to create a pattern on drawing paper. They have to do problem solving work along the way and will finish project with some colored markers.







We've been practicing very hard to put together great performances and we only have a few more days until our concerts in December. We ask that children wear a fancy outfit that reflects this special event – the more festive, the better! There are no specific color requirements.
