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# Message from the Principal

Regardless of the month, each day we continue to stress the importance of instructional content areas such as reading and writing in preparing our children for a successful future. Another way we can prepare our children for a successful future is to allow them to recognize the importance of our planet, and how to take care of it. During the month of April, Earth Day signifies the perfect time to do this!

There are a number of engaging activities and important lessons you can consider when raising environmental awareness in your household with your children. Here are a few suggestions for your family to consider...

- <u>Save Energy:</u> Explain to your children that televisions, computers, and lights use energy. Teach them to turn off appliances and lights when you leave the room.
- <u>Conserve Water:</u> According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), a family of four uses 400 gallons of water every day on average. To conserve water in your household, be sure your children know to turn off the water while they are brushing their teeth. Perhaps they can even take shorter showers.
- Recycle: Explain to your child that waste that is thrown away simply sits in a local dump or landfill if we don't recycle. Be sure they are involved in the process of recycling paper, plastic, bottles, cardboard, and aluminum cans. Perhaps you can even find new and creative ways to use these materials in your home after cleaning them.

#### **Small Things You Can Do...**

- Walk or ride a bike instead of traveling by car when possible.
- Donate old clothes, toys, shoes, or other reusable items instead of throwing them away.
- Take nature walks to recognize the beauty and inspiration that surround us!

Although Earth Day is marked on our calendars only once a year, it is important to teach children and adults ways we can make everyday Earth Day.

#### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOMS...

PRE-SCHOOL: Buildings far, buildings near....Preschool is building our way through the year! In March, we completed our "Buildings Study" by learning about what happens inside buildings. We learned so much about the buildings in our neighborhood, and had fun exploring beautiful buildings from around the world! After we completed our building study, we began the "Pet Study." Some of the preschool classes have a class pet to care for, observe, and love! We began the study by investigating to find out which kinds of animals are pets. Thanks to the PTO, Eyes Of The Wild came to Milton with a pot belly pig, dove, iguana, rabbit, and tortoise for the preschool students to pet and learn about. It was a huge thrill for everyone and really enriched our study! We ended the month of March by investigating where pets live. spent the month playing in our Pet Store, using craft supplies to create pets, building pet habitats at our d

We spent the month playing in our Pet Store, using craft supplies to create pets, building pet habitats at our discovery center, going fishing in our water table, and building pet homes in the block center. As April approaches we will continue our "Pet Study" by investigating what pets eat and how we care for pets. After Spring break Preschool looks forward to beginning our "Recycling Study." Mrs. Laura's preschool students talked about buildings they frequent in the community. We focused on pre-reading skills by looking at the logos of some of our favorite places. We also talked about community helpers and transportation. After we completed the *Building Study*, we moved on to talking about animals. We learned about zoo animals the first week and had a visit from Eyes of the Wild. We were able to see and touch a bunny! Thank you to the PTO for this wonderful assembly. We then learned about farm animals and things associated with farm animals. In upcoming weeks, we will be talking about pets and how we care for pets.

**KINDERGARTEN:** Kindergarten is excited to be MARCHing into spring! In reading, kindergarten focused on checking our reading to ensure accuracy. We ask ourselves 3 important questions, "Does it look right? Does it sound right? Does it make sense?" In math, we practiced composing and decomposing numbers all the way up to 19 and learned about numbers on a hundred chart! We learned *How to Calm Down* by stopping, naming our feeling, and belly breathing. Kindergarten is looking forward to enjoying spring weather in April!

FIRST GRADE: March has flown by very quickly in first grade. We have been very busy in math. We have learned how to compare two digit numbers by using the greater than and less than symbols. We are beginning to "regroup" by asking ourselves if we can make a ten. We were excited to learn this is what second grade math will be like! The students have also used mental math to add two digit numbers in their heads. It's always fun to give your child a problem that they can try to solve in their head! We have come to the end of our reading and writing nonfiction units. First graders are now focusing on writing realistic fiction. by creating characters and giving them adventures, problems and solutions. We are being the "boss" of our reading by self-correcting and problem solving difficult words. We know that it is important to understand what we read! We enjoyed Author's Day and meeting Jeff Mack. We hope that March goes out like a lamb and that April starts to bring us warm spring weather!

**SECOND GRADE:** March was a busy month for second graders. In science, they completed the Earth Systems unit and will move into the final unit, Interdependent Relationships in the Ecosystems. They will learn about different habitats, adaptation, as well as the life cycles. Second grade mathematicians are continuing with 3-digit addition and subtraction strategies and will then move into measurement. Second grade poets are immersed in writing poetry about big feelings and are successfully using literary language to convey their thoughts. We will be sending home a sampling of your child's poetry in April.

THIRD GRADE: In the month of March our third graders explored the unit of character study for reading. They followed a character's journey in chapter books with reading partnerships and reading independently. Students noticed and identified how a character experiences a series of events, the climax of the story, and how the character personally resolves the big trouble. In writer's workshop, students just wrapped up opinion writing and will start planning, and drafting their own adaptation of a fairy tale of their choice. In math, students spent the month identifying and comparing fractions. Earlier this month, third graders enjoyed the Read Across America fun-themed week, and spent time with their first grade buddies. We are looking forward to April and Spring!

attending school. Medication cannot be given without a signature from the child's parent and physician. Please give any prescribed allergy medication to your child prior to coming to school and remind them to WASH THEIR HANDS after recess to prevent the spread of pollen and other allergens.

\*Please continue to notify the school nurse if your child has been diagnosed with Strep throat, influenza, or any other communicable disease.\* This helps us to identify trends in an illness and keep everyone in the MAS school community informed.

Please report any diagnosis of a concussion to the school nurse. Concussions occur more often in the Spring and Summer months. Indications of a concussion after a head injury include headache, blurry vision, dizziness, lethargy, nausea, and/or vomiting. Signs and symptoms of a concussion may not occur until hours are the injury. Check with your child's Pediatrician after any sports-related head injury to ensure proper recovery time.

Please enter absences in the Parent Portal or call the absentee line before 8:30am and 12:00pm for the afternoon sessions, if your child will not be coming to school or will be late. DO NOT email your child's teacher as they do not enter verified absences.

In the month of March the students at Milton had opportunity to practice Mindfulness during my classroom visits. We used guided activities from a website called Mind Yeti (www.mindyeti.com). Mind Yeti pairs with our Second Step curriculum that we use to teach social emotional learning.



Success in the classroom only happens when children are in the right frame of mind to learn. When they're distracted and can't focus—what

we call "having a case of the Hubbub"—Mind Yeti helps kids calm down, focus better, and feel more connected to themselves and others. It also provides a great foundation for boosting Second Step skills. We participated in guided practice of "mindful listening". It was fun as well as a challenge to test our listening skills.



#### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN...

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**First Grade:** First grade classes have discussed nutrition and the "My Plate" concept, which stresses the importance of having a plate full of different food groups and the value of their nutrients. Students have started discussing the importance of physical fitness!

**Second Grade:** The second grade students just learned about disabilities and disability etiquette. The students learned about different types of physical disabilities and how to respectfully communicate with those who have a physical disability. They also learned about different accommodations that can be helpful. We also watched several clips of Paralympic sporting events, which the students seemed to enjoy.

**Third Grade:** The most recent topic we covered in class was sportsmanship. Sportsmanship involves the social, emotional and even the spiritual dimensions of health. This is a topic that we cover in first, second and third grade, but in third grade, I try to encourage the students to be a bit more personally reflective of their own sportsmanship practices in their lives. I often tell the students that knowing how to be a good sport and actually being a good sport are two different things.



#### FROM THE ART ROOM

First grade classes learned about perspective recently. To help students visualize size and distance in relation, we painted a field of Poppy flowers. Flowers up close in the foreground were painted larger with more detail and as we moved higher in the picture into the background flowers were made smaller and smaller with less detail. All the flowers were hung outside the Art room to celebrate the beginning of Spring!

**Second Graders** this month are working on Mola artwork. Mola is fabric art created by indigenous people of Panama known as Kuna people. Students studied examples of the work and even had the chance to look at a real one. Students were inspired to create Animal Molas out of paper, while decorating with marker, crayon and paint. The works are colorful and eye catching!

**Third graders** have been working on patterned Abstract animal collages inspired by the work of Clare Youngs. Clare Youngs is known for creating a variety of drawn and painted patterns on paper and then cutting and collaging to create the whimsical silhouette of an animal. After studying her work students were inspired to create their own patterns. Stunning work!

Kindergarten—Practicing Our Typing Skills Students have been spending time getting more familiar with the keyboard and practicing their typing skills with ABCYa games such as "Cup Stacking" and "Typing Rocket Jr.".
