

Report absences via <u>ParentPortal</u>

Flu season is beginning... The CDC recommends that you and your family members should get a flu vaccine before flu begins spreading in your community. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies that protect against flu to develop in the body, so make plans to get vaccinated early in fall, before flu season begins. The CDC recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October.



It is required that any child attending Preschool, ages 59 months and younger obtain a flu vaccine and documentation is provided to Mrs. Zotti by January 2nd 2019. Students will be excluded from school by the Health Department until March 2019 if it is not received by that date.

Please note, if you think your child has a fever, please check their temperature with a thermometer. If their temperature is 100 degrees or greater, please allow them some restful time at home to recuperate and get well. Your child must remain home for 24 hours after the fever has subsided without fever reducing medication.

Please enter absences in the Parent Portal or call the absentee line before 8:30am and 12:00pm for the afternoon sessions, if your child will not be coming to school or will be late.

The month of October began with the Week of Respect. The students and teachers engaged in activities that highlighted being an "upstander" and why sticking up for others is important. As a way for us to show that kindness is at the "heart" of Milton, the whole student body and staff formed a heart on the front lawn of our school—what a terrific way to begin our week!

The Counseling Classroom lessons focused on being respectful listeners and The Golden Rule. In November I will be utilizing our Social Emotional Learning curriculum-Second Step. Lessons are focused on our feelings and showing compassion for others.

COUNSELING GROUPS

I will be offering small group counseling this year. Small groups support and enhance the development of personal and social skills and promote educational success. Small groups provide additional social-emotional learning experiences and give the students a chance to belong, a chance to express themselves, and a chance to benefit from the support of group members.

The small groups that I am offering this year are as follows:

Friendship Group (social skills) - Friendship groups are intended for students who need or would like to work on strengthening their friendship skills. Groups will focus on acknowledging and strengthening the friendship qualities we have to offer others, how to connect and communicate with others, building friendly behaviors, and dealing with friendship problems.

Peacemakers (emotional regulation) - This group is intended for students who need or would like to learn how to regulate their emotions. During group we will explore emotional triggers, learn how to identify different emotional zones as we enter them, and build effective coping skills.

FISH (Families in separate home) - this can be a group comprised of students from varying grades whose parents are divorced or going through a divorce.

These groups will start in late November and will meet for 30 minutes per week for six weeks (with the potential to extend). Teachers can refer students who they feel will benefit from small group support and parents can refer as well. WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CLASSROOMS...



PRE-SCHOOL: October has been a fun and busy month for the preschoolers. We completed our TREE study by exploring different kinds of trees, how trees grow, and what animals can be found in trees. We spent time outside going on nature walks to collect sticks, acorns, and various types of leaves. We finished the month by learning about the sights and sounds of Halloween. We also turned the preschool playground into a pumpkin patch! The students were able to pick a pumpkin and play on the bales of hay. Next


month, we will explore the topics of FAMILY, HARVEST and THANKSGIVING.

KINDERGARTEN: Kindergarten has been busy learning how to be storybook readers this month! We learned about different strategies to help us read and remember our favorite stories. In Social Studies, we have begun our unit about what makes each of us special and unique. We also got an extra special visit from the Chatham fire department. We learned about fire safety, the fire trucks and equipment, and even got to take turns squirting the hose! We got to meet our second grade buddy classes and create jack-o-lanterns showing different feelings together. We are looking forward to learning about Thanksgiving, gratitude and traditions in November. Gobble, gobble!

FIRST GRADE: First Graders worked very hard at school during the month of October. We learned new strategies and good habits for solving hard words when we are reading. They know to look for word parts in words and to try to read the word two ways (long and short vowel sound.) Ask your child about other strategies such as Eagle Eye, Stretchy Snake, Skippy Frog and Chunky Monkey. Hopefully they are applying these strategies when they are reading at home too! In math we have learned to use number lines and ten frames to help us with addition and subtraction. First Graders are learning about the moon in science and the different phases of the moon. Has your child shared about "Jack and Jill on the Moon" with you? You may never look at the moon in the same way again. We had our first field trip to

Reeves Arboretum and learned so much about trees and nature. We are looking forward to November and learning about Thanksgiving traditions.

SECOND GRADE: October was a busy month for second graders! As readers, second graders have been working on using strategies to solve tricky words as well as posting their thinking when they read. As writers, they have been working hard on



THIRD GRADE: Third graders were busy in the month of October! Writing is well underway and students are working on developing their personal narratives to include sensory details, trying to SHOW not TELL, and sprinkling in dialog. Our next step is publishing! In reading, third graders are busy learning how to use post-its to stop and jot their thinking and then stretching their thinking by writing about it in their reading workshop notebooks. We have finished our first unit and are now into MYSTERIES! As we read we will try to read like a crime solver, trying to pay close attention to the text for clues to try and solve the problem before the book tells us! In math, we have finished our multiplication topics and are now learning about how multiplication and division are related. We are using known multiplication facts to solve division problems. PLEASE continue to practice multiplication facts every night! Each class also has a first grade buddy class whom we met with this month and completed a getting to know you activity! 3C is partners with 1T, 3K with 1Z, and 3R is with 1V.







ON THE RUN

First grade students are very enthusiastic and have been giving a great effort in class. We have been spending a lot of time working on throwing and catching skills this year. I like to use beanbags for many of the activities, because students are able to easily catch it without being scared of being hit. The improvement in many of the students' skills so far has been quite remarkable. A couple weeks ago, we went outside and practiced throwing Frisbees, and I was very proud of their effort and ability to pick up the skill. The students have done a good job in being prepared for class with sneakers, which helps keep them safe.

Second and third graders have completed fitness testing concepts in the following area; Pacer Run (cardiovascular endurance), Push Up Test (muscular strength), and Curl Up Test (muscular endurance). Fitness has been taught as a life long skill and how fitness applies to different areas of daily life and activities. In the spring, a second assessment will be completed to compare growth and achievement.

During this month of respect, we shared stories about how to be a good friend, how to show respect in our communities, and how to respect ourselves. Grades 1 - 3 participated in Digital Citizenship lessons to introduce how to be respectful and respected when going online. Many of our students are already communicating in an online forum through social media and online gaming. Through our Digital Citizenship curriculum, students were introduced to strategies like STOP (step away, tell an adult, okay sites first, pause and think online) and THINK (is what you're about to post True, Helpful, Inspiring, Necessary, Kind).

We have kicked off our reading program, "Pop into a Good Book!" We are looking for students to write down the books they are reading and bring in reading logs to earn points with their classmates to dedicate books into the library! Every year, our library collection acquires over 120 books through this program! Reading logs can be printed at home—check out the Milton website for a copy!

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ...

First Grade—During the month of October students discussed and identified ways to prevent injuries at home, school, and in the community (e.g., fire safety, poison safety, accident prevention).

Second Grade—We recently did a lesson with the students on sportsmanship, talking about what good sportsmanship looks like, and the importance of displaying good sportsmanship when playing any kind of game. Another recent topic was physical fitness. The students learned that the 5 components of health-related fitness are: cardiovascular fitness, muscular strength, muscular endurance, flexibility, and body composition. The students did a good job demonstrating understanding of this topic.

Third Grade—Students recently learned about the components of skill-related fitness. We reviewed the concepts from last year when we learned about health-related fitness, and built on that knowledge. While health-related fitness will help people hopefully live a long and healthy life, skill-related fitness (agility, balance, coordination, power, reaction, and speed) help people perform skills well. First graders are learning about the color wheel. We created fall trees using warm and cool colors, while mixing colors where trees overlapped.

Second graders have created awesome owl mixed media artworks. After studying some references students used pencil, marker, oil pastel and paint to create patterned Owls.

Third grade will be working on painted tree compositions while focusing on positive and negative space,. Positive space is the subject of the artwork and negative space is the background. Students worked to create trees that filled the paper to create a nice balance of positive and negative space.
